1 – Overall objective	To ensure every child at St Hugh of Lincoln has the opportunity to enjoy, appreciate, experience, sing, play, understand, perform and create music within their school life. Music is for everyone. "Music can change the world" Beethoven

2 – Key components	1. Music curriculum — Our Music curriculum is delivered weekly by the music teacher Mrs Ali. Throughout our curriculum we ensure to give each and every child the opportunity to learn and understand music at their level and beyond where possible. We realise the importance of music for each and every child in our school and we have set out to give every child access to music within our school music lessons. The children will listen to music from different genres and styles from around the world. They will play musical instruments as much as possible, they will sing, perform, create and use technology where possible and listen to music with understanding. 2. The child will learn and experience how music has changed and developed through time. 3. We will use music technology to enhance each child's learning encouraging composition and help the children create and express through music. 4. We aim to give each and every child from — EYFS, KS1, KS2 and SEND the opportunity to love and develop in music. 5. Sign post children to TMS when they are unable to attend music lessons within the school day. 6. Each class with receive at least 30 mins of music each week by our music teacher Mrs Ali.
	7. Children in KS1 will use their voices, percussion instruments and body



percussion alongside the glockenspiel to help develop their understanding of music.

- 8. LKS1 will continue with the glockenspiel and in KS2 the children will learn the recorder and the Ukulele.
- 9. Children who already have instrumental lessons will have the opportunity to take part at a higher level at every opportunity.
- 10. We take part in Trafford Music Service singing events.
- 11. We invite external groups to work with all the children when we can throughout the year.
- 12. We have started a free recorder club in school to reach out to the children who show a special love of music in the classroom and beyond. (Include Pupil Premium Students)
- 13. Pupil Premium student are encouraged to learn instruments within school with Mrs Ali particularly if they are especially talented in music or show and interest in learning.
- 14. We review our curriculum and delivery of music throughout the year and Mrs Ali attends TMS training throughout the school year.
- 15. We have a school Choir, Violin and recorder ensemble each week.
- 16. We have two singing assemblies each week (KS1&KS2).
- 17. The children perform termly in our Christmas/Easter and end of year events.
- 18. The school choir go out into the community to perform for the elderly and the public at Christmas time and for social events/school events.
- 19. We would like to have more musical engagement with feeder primary and secondary schools.

We have joined together in the past with a local primary school to raise money for charity and this event was a huge success.

3 – Classroom instrumental teaching

At St Hugh of Lincoln each class will have music lesson each week for approximately 45 mins, delivered by a music specialist.

We use the Charanga music scheme alongside material chosen by the music teacher to enhance the Charanga programme.

We aim to meet the needs of all children in the class where possible – using different music material to access all abilities.

- *i.e develop/change the way music is written to help children with SEND understand.*
- Encourage using their voices expressively and with hand signs/sign language where possible.
- use musical instruments to help with hearing/speaking/self-expression.
- access to adapted instruments or ICT to overcome difficulties with mobility or manipulative skills.



We use different musical instruments/resources to help encourage all our children to take part in their music lessons. From percussion instruments to the Ukulele to conducting and leadership skills.

We strongly believe that music is for everyone.

We would like to host more performances at St Hugh of Lincoln and we would like to invite more external performers to our school for inspiration and enjoyment.

We offer instrumental lessons in Key Stage 1 and 2 including recorder, violin lessons, guitar lessons and piano lessons.

We have an afterschool violin club, a lunch time choir and a recorder club.

4 – Implementation of key components

At St Hugh of Lincoln, we believe music is an integral part of our school life. We are committed to providing a service for our children which inspires them to see the importance of music in their lives.

Through listening to a wide range of musical styles - singing, playing musical instruments and composing - we make music an enjoyable learning experience. All children are encouraged to participate in a variety of musical genres through which we aim to build up their love of music. We are committed to giving our students the skills, to use their musical ideas and knowledge to enhance self-confidence and self-expression in the classroom and beyond.

As children progress through the school, they will learn how music is created through the interrelated dimensions of music: pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and musical notation. By Key Stage 2, children will begin to explore improvisation and composition techniques.

Our Music Curriculum ensures that the children develop skills to sing, listen, play, perform and evaluate. This is delivered in each classroom through the music programme Charanga, a clear and comprehensive scheme of work which covers all the National Curriculum requirements in a full and progressive way.

In addition to our music lessons children will have opportunities to perform in various concerts/performances throughout the year, such as in class assemblies, liturgies, class Instrumental lessons, as well as learning from specialist music teachers.

Music will be included as much as possible in the classroom to help enhance other areas of our School Curriculum.

6 Evaluation process for the	Each child is assessed on a tormly basis
6 – Evaluation process for the success of the Music Development Plan	Each child is assessed on a termly basis. Our music specialist provides regular updates on children's achievements and how music is being implemented across the school. When necessary the music curriculum is adapted.
7 – Transition work with local secondary schools	Mrs Ali and our year 6 teachers attend meetings with Trafford Music Service regarding the transition of year 6 children to our local secondary schools, teaching them material and songs so that they are able to play alongside their peers in high school. This enables our students in year 6 to be more confidence in music at high school and common ground with their peers, helping them to settle more easily into their new schools.



8 – Budget materials and staffing	All our teachers have music CPD on a weekly basis as they assist with their class music lessons. This gives them the opportunity to learn and record their student's development in music on a weekly basis. Teachers regularly update their class blogs to showcase their classes musical achievements. We have signed up to Charanga and Sing up programmes to help enhance our music provision. Our resources include Glockenspiels and Percussion instruments for KS1, Percussion, Glockenspiel's, Ukulele's and Recorders for KS2.
9 – Pupil Premium and SEND provision	Pupils Premium are given the opportunity to learn a musical instrument if they show a particular interest. SEND students are given extra help during their music sessions and the music teacher will always adapt the lesson to accommodate their needs. i.e giving the children a more appropriate instrument or part to play, a conducting/leadership role if they are happy to do this, movement exercises/easy signing/expressing themselves through art.
10 – Summary Action Plan	This year at St Hugh we aspire to deliver a rich curriculum of music across our school, aiming to enhance the lives of all our children from nursery to year 6. We will create more opportunities for performance and will create more ways/ideas to help and include all the children in our school. (By the end of this school year) In addition to our school performances, we invite performers to school and we will be hosting a musical evening for as many children as possible to be involved in. (Term 2/3) Music listening will be a big part of our school life giving children the exposure to all different styles/genres of music. (Throughout the school year and supported by teachers as a part of their daily/weekly teaching plan) We hope that our children will see themselves as confident musicians and leaders in their music lessons and we hope to give them the confidence to shine, compose, perform and overall love the music they play and listen to, as music is there for all to enjoy. Mrs Ali will take part in CPD in music technology in the classroom and will continue to attend meetings with Trafford Music service and others where possible.
